THIS CONFERENCE

Care policies not only need to respond to changing needs by providing good quality services, but also to be financially and socially sustainable, in a long-term and inter-generational perspective, and from the perspectives of care users, their families and paid care workers. This is a difficult challenge for policies as well as for informal and formal care practices, with strong implications as to how care services and care work are organized and provided.

The conference focuses on the tensions between policy and social innovation in care policies on the one hand, and pressures for financial and social sustainability of care systems on the other. This complex topic will be addressed from different perspectives through 20 thematic panels, 5 symposia, 3 keynote addresses, and a final round table discussion.

Thematic panels are organized in five parallel tracks:





The Sforza Castle was built in the 15th century by Francesco Sforza, Duke of Milan, on the remains of a 14th-century fortification. Later renovated and enlarged, in the 16th and 17th centuries it was one of the largest citadels in Europe. Extensively rebuilt during the 19th century, it now houses several of the city's museums and art collections.

Take Metro Line 2 (green line) towards Abbiategrasso – Assago. Change to Metro 1 at Loreto (only 1 stop). Take Metro Line 1 (red line) towards Rho-Fiera Stop at Cairoli. From there, about 300 mt walking.
